## **God's Word for Warriors** July 1, 2019

Living at the Edge of Eternity

One of the most powerful and revolutionary sentences in the Lord's Prayer (Matthew 6:9-12) is, "Thy kingdom come, on earth as in heaven." This statement entails the concept of an immortal soul and the resurrection to a new life. This, in turn, leads to a major question: "If I died tonight, where would I spend eternity?"

Many reading this article are veterans and have experienced combat, no doubt wondering at these perilous moments, "Where is God? Did he check out because of what was going on there?"


The loss of religious faith is so widespread among veterans today, a loss that bears little likeness to the sterile and bloodless agnosticisms of many university campuses and the secular society. And this rejection of faith by many veterans is active, passionate, almost physical, and is rooted in the best of reasons – feelings of betrayal, abandonment, and a perceived failure to deliver on God's part.

Many veterans come out of combat with a different faith than they may have once held – a faith that may never be the same again – either deeper or even lost. And others spend a lifetime of struggling to find God in the midst of hell. Nowhere more than in combat does one sense the truth of Bernard Clairveaux's word that "we live at the edge of eternity."

None experience the awareness of evil and are conscious of evil and sin in this world as many of our veterans. Often their anger, confusion and spiritual emptiness are directed against God, as they faced unaccustomed darkness. And so we ask again, "If I died tonight, where would I spend eternity?"

Reflecting on these thoughts brings up the importance of reaching out to assist our veterans as they face such situations in life. This need motivated Lipscomb University to reach out to our veteran students with classes, *God's Word for Warriors*, designed to assist these men and women in their post-deployment educational goals.
